
TROUTFEST

MY LAST TRIP TO THE GUADALUPE RIVER FOR THE 2022-23 TROUT FISHING SEASON



Well, it's time for another season of fishing on the Guadalupe River Last year to end. (2021-22) I joined the Guadalupe River Trout Unlimited lease access program. Once you are in the river, you are okay, legally. But getting to the river usually means crossing private property, which requires permission. The lease access program provides permission at about a dozen places. In last year's season, I

spent 22 days on the Guadalupe River. I had a blast and learned a lot. So, I joined the lease access program again this year. This year I was able to be there 24 days. On most of the trips I was able to fish with friends, which made the trips even more memorable.

This past Monday (March 6) I headed over to the river with my friend Steve Edwards. This time the weather was conducive for us to tent camp, which is my preferred way to go. After some medical appointments in the morning we headed over. We arrived in time to set up camp and enjoy a nice meal of homemade chicken noodle soup. After that it was time to sit and watch the river, talk about fishing and life, and enjoy the stars and full moon. This was pretty much our routine each evening. We didn't solve all the world's problems, but we tried.

We fished morning and evenings Tuesday and Wednesday, and a few hours Thursday morning. Our routine was to get up, have our coffee (me) and hot tea (Steve), eat a light breakfast, then head out to fish. Around mid-day we would head back to the camp, have lunch, and rest a few hours. The temperature was getting up on the mid-80s in the afternoon. Water temperatures in the morning were about 66 degrees and rose to 68 degrees in the afternoons. Around 3:00 we would fish another spot until about 6:00 or so.

We caught trout most outings. Because of the warm weather, the sunfish were also active and we caught more of them than I had ever caught there during trout season.

Thursday morning was actually my best outing this year. I went to a run in the river where I had caught some fish before.

I headed down to the bottom of the run. I started with a nymph rig under an indicator. I used a Y2K for an attractor and a red zebra midge on the bottom. I worked my way up the run. I got six fish hooked and missed that many more. Two got off quickly; one broke my line on a rock; two got off after a good fight (early releases); one ended up in the net. I worked my way up to and around some larger trees that hang low over the water. It is just not possible to get an indicator under them with a good drift. But I kept thinking that there must be some fish under those trees.

So, I decided to pull out my other rod which I rigged with a Thin Mint attractor and a soft hackle fly with a little red in the body as a trailer (since I had been catching them with a red zebra midge). I began to work my way back down the same run, only this time swinging the streamers. With this rig I was able to side arm cast under the trees. I caught five as I worked my way down the run and three were under the trees where I couldn't get to with an indicator rig. I had one additional good take. I really liked the way those trout took the soft hackles. No questions about a take. And I think I did fairly well at strip setting. I chased several down stream to wear them out and finally get them upstream from me so I could net them above me rather than below me-heads up and coming downstream into the net. I'm learning! I had taken a seminar at Troutfest on how to land them and I tried applying what I had learned. All this was 8:00-10:30. Twelve trout on and six in the net. In addition, I caught a few sunfish. I'll take that just about any day!

It was then time to pack up camp and head home.

So ended my Guadalupe River 2022-23 trout season. I am so grateful: to have been able to spend 24 days on the river, to have caught many fish, that I was not hurt, for a supportive wife, to be alive and in reasonably for good health, and for friends with which to share the experiences and have good conversation.

Being in the water fly fishing benefits my mental and spiritual well-being in a number of ways. In the water I feel a sense of awe. I experience a sense of being connected to something greater than myself. I had many experiences of deep feelings of worship as I stood in the river, connected with the Creator.





MY LAST TRIP-CONTD.

Being in the water fishing also provides soothing sensory experiences. The sounds, the smells and sight of a body of water is relaxing. They help me to stay centered and find a calming, positive state of mind.

Being in the water fishing also facilitates mindfulness and reflection. Water in a flowing river is dynamic. It has different colors. It has different shapes. It has different sounds. It is moving. While standing in the river, my my attention is on those things rather than all the noise of the world.

There is something rhythmic about fly fishing. The back and forth rhythmic cadence of casting helps me to take all my troubles and cast them far away, even if just for a little while. The catching of a fish and releasing it reminds me that there can be new beginnings for me as well.

Steve Ramirez said it well: "Fly fishing reminds me to slow down, live now, let go. I cast as I breath. I retrieve line to the rhythm of my heart beating. And so, I stand in the river casting back and forth, trying to lose that feeling of being alone. It is then that the rainbow rises and takes my offering. I raise my rod, and all at once, I am no longer alone. I am connected to his powerful runs, facing into the current. Silver line connects us, both fighting to live—two beating hearts. He comes to my net. I hold him gently, rocking him back and forth in the cold rushing water. 'Gain your strength, dear warrior,' I say. Am I speaking to him or to myself? With a kick of his tail, he returns to the river—and I go with him."

I am a blessed man.



THE DOHICKY FLY



This is a fun fly to tie and great to use fly fishing for sunfish and small bass - especially with young fly fishers. Each Spring, sunfish gather in large groups in shallow water to spawn. A great way to introduce youngsters to fly fishing is to find such a spot and use a productive fly, such as the Dohicky fly, and have them catch a mess of sunfish.

This fly can be tied in many different colors to match the environment you are fishing. The black over pink example below has been productive in East Texas lakes - especially early in the morning when the sun is low. But it can be tied with colors such as brown over yellow, green over yellow and black over tan, black over white, etc. The main concept is to use contrasting colors so the fly is easy to see. The rubber band legs, which add a lot of motion to the fly, can be of different colors, also. Between varying the chenille and rubber band leg colors, you can creatively come up with multiple flies to cover just about any fly fishing environment.

Materials

Hook - TMC100 or similar hook - sizes 4, 6 or 8. Be sure to bend down the barb as sunfish will swallow this fly deep into their throats, making it difficult to remove the hook.

Body - Chenille - two contrasting colors - one dark and one light Legs - rubber band legs - a color that is different that the Chenille colors

Weight - .020 lead-free wire

Thread - 0/8 or similar - same color as the dark-colored Chenille



Step 1 Wrap the hook with thread from eye to bend.







so there is room to tie in the front rubber band legs. The lead-free wire balances the fly so it stays level in the water when not being retrieved. This is an important concept when designing flies for still waters - to make sure the center of gravity of the fly is near the middle to front so the fly doesn't sink back end first. I've never seen anything in nature that sinks back-end first.







Step 2 First, tie in the rubber band leg at an angle.

Step 3

Bend rubber band leg over and tie down so the legs are at about a 30-degree angle.

Step 4

Tie in the light-colored Chenille first, then tie in the dark-colored Chenille over the top of the light-colored Chenille. Then make 4-5 wraps of .020 lead-free wire in front of the Chenille but make sure not to get too close to the eye of the hook

Step 5 Wrap the light-colored Chenille up to the lead-free wire then tie it off with a few wraps.

Step 6 light-colored the

Step 7

Fold the dark-colored Chenille over the top of the light-colored Chenille and tie it off behind the leadfree wire with a few wraps.



Step 8

Wrap the thread forward and tie in the front rubber band legs using the same technique as the back legs.



Step 9

Wrap the dark-colored Chenille forward to behind the eye and tie off with a few wraps. Trim the Chenille, whip finish, trim the thread and apply a small amount of head cement.

Trim the front and back legs to the same length. Then go catch some fish!

CONSERVATION NEWS





Not good news for Texas, which now leads the nation in emitting toxic substances into streams, rivers, and lakes. As our state rapidly grows, our growing pains are causing more and more conservation issues. Texas makes it ideal for big companies to move here, and take advantage of laxed laws, and light penalties for breaking these laws. Companies are required to file with regulatory agencies to discharge chemicals, or treated water, but rarely does the public ever hear about these discharges. This is where we can do our part, by spending the time to request these filings, and share what these big companies are doing.

Check out this news.

One bad example of this is happening on the San Marcos River right now. Wastewater pollution is drastically changing our river, and setting an example for what may occur, but can work on to prevent. The river west of Georgetown is now full of algae due to chemicals that have been released Into the river. Some think that treated water is OK to add to a river system, don't quite understand what the effects can do. One such group does understand and is working to preserve the San Gabriel river. Thank you to the group https://nodumpingsewage.org/.

We also want to remind clubs and members of the many Spring clean ups that will be taking place soon. Please support these organized cleanups and help keep our areas near us in a better place. One that happens near us in DFW is the TRWD Trash Bash. To complete this certification process and learn about the Why, How and with Who, the FFI Learning Center is the place to go.

Casting Instructor Certification Overview

History and Overview

The Casting Instructor Certification Program (CICP) was developed to enhance the overall level of instruction in fly casting by increasing instructor knowledge, casting proficiency, and teaching ability. A secondary goal was to create a common understanding of casting terminology and casting mechanics that would serve the fly casting community, internationally and in North America.

Objectives of the Program

The CICP Program's main objectives are to educate and enhance the growth of fly casting instructors by:

- Establishing high and consistent standards for casting instructors.
- Administering a test that fairly and consistently assesses the candidate's knowledge of casting, teaching ability, and casting proficiency.
- Conducting teaching workshops as a required part of certification.
- Conducting clinics on how to teach fly casting at FFI shows, fairs, and consumer fishing demonstrations.
- Developing and maintaining an instruction reference for certified instructors.
- Establishing and maintaining communication networks for certified instructors.
- Facilitating the exchange of ideas between instructors worldwide.

Who Runs the Program?

The Casting Board of Governors, or CBOG as it is referred

to in the Bylaws, has developed and administers the Casting Instructor Certification Program of Fly Fishers International.

While the CBOG administers the CICP, the success of the program is dependent on involvement of Master Casting Instructors (MCI) working at the local level. MCIs play a key role in the CICP as they instruct students, teach, and mentor candidates toward Casting Instructor (CI) certification. Masters also teach and mentor CI instructors to become Master Casting Instructors.

The CICP recognizes all casting and fishing associations throughout the world in their endeavors to improve the level of casting instruction, as well as their efforts to preserve our natural resources. The CICP seeks judgment only within its own programs and continually monitors its status, seeking improvement through education.


Why is this good for our Sport?

Training and certifying fly casting instructors will provide beginners with a smoother entry into fly fishing due to the increased skill level of FFI-certified fly casting instructors. Fly fishers have ready access to instructors trained to help them advance to the next level. The CICP fosters exchanges of teaching and casting ideas among instructors across the world.



Positive Developments on Three Important Conservation Efforts

2023 has begun with protections for the Bristol Bay headwaters and the Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness, as well as the reinstatement of roadless rules in the Tongass National Forest.

Under its Clean Water Act Section 404(c) authority, the Environmental Protection Agency has issued a Final Determination limiting the disposal of dredged and fill material associated with developing the proposed Pebble Mine. The EPA decision prohibits the South Fork Koktuli River and North Fork Koktuli River watersheds as disposal sites for the discharge of dredged or fill material for the construction and routine operation of the mine plan described in Pebble Limited Partnership's June 8, 2020, Clean Water Act Section 404 Permit application.

This development represents a major victory in the effort to protect the most productive wild salmon ecosystem in the world. Fly Fishers International has been an active collaborator alongside our many conservation partners in advocating for protections of Bristol Bay like this most recent action by the EPA.

Tom Logan, FFI Board Member and Conservation Committee Chair, on this recent EPA action:

"Fly Fishers International has worked with our many Conservation Partners for decades providing 'public' and "'technical comment' illustrating the undeniable threats the proposed Pebble Mine and other mining operations would impart on the Bristol Bay system and the world-class salmon fishery it supports. The Environmental Protection Agency is to be applauded for their 'Final Determination' that is based upon 'best available science' to establish permanent protection to the Bristol Bay Watershed. Protection of Bristol Bay in this manner serves as a global example of how important it is to preserve health and function of our natural landscapes for fish, wildlife, our own qualities of life and the planet!"

While this certainly represents a major win for FFI and our Conservation Partners, the month of January also brought good news in ongoing efforts to protect the Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness and maintain the roadless rules in the Tongass National Forest.

On January 26th, Secretary of the Interior Deb Haaland signed Public Land Order 7917 withdrawing approximately 225,504 acres in the Superior National Forest in northeastern Minnesota from disposition under the United States mineral and geothermal leasing laws for a 20-year period, subject to valid existing rights. This action will help protect the Rainy River watershed, including the Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness, from the potential adverse impacts of new mineral and geothermal exploration and development.

One day before, on January 25th, the U.S. Department of Agriculture finalized protections for the Tongass National Forest in Alaska. The USDA's final rule repeals the 2020 Alaska Roadless Rule and restores longstanding roadless protections to 9.37 million acres of roadless areas that support the ecological, economic and cultural values of Southeastern Alaska.

Prior Preparation for Saltwater Success By Bruce Chard, FFI Ambassador

Anticipating and preparing for your next saltwater fly fishing adventure can be as exciting as the feeling of a giant tarpon ripping line off your reel as it launches itself into the atmosphere! Well...maybe not that exciting, but I like to think of the popular saying "life is what you make it". I believe a saltwater fly fishing trip is what you make it as well. So, let's have a little fun and dive into some advice from experience that will help you to make the most of your next saltwater fly fishing adventure.

Now is the time to prep for your success on the saltwater flats. As many of us are making our way through winter, with less-thanideal fishing conditions, it's a great time to take a look at your saltwater fly fishing gear and skills so you'll be ready when you step onto the flats or a skiff later this year. Review Your Gear

Take some time to review your reels, including inspecting the frame, retrieve handle, spool, and drag mechanism. Make sure your drag works smoothly. You want a smooth start up and a full drag range from light to solid tension. Different drag mechanisms require unique maintenance and lubrication. A smooth operating drag system makes for a happy reel and a happy angler.

Double check for any corrosion that may have been caused by errant saltwater from your last outing. Since most saltwater fly reels are designed and constructed with many dissimilar metals for increased strength and durability there are risks of corrosion. It's important to stay away from products like WD-40 to remove corrosion, as this product is actually a degreaser and will literally eat all the very important oils and grease that help your reel function. Since all reels are made differently, check with your reel manufacturer on the best way to maintain your specific reel.

How's that fly line and backing looking? Inspect the connection points, especially the fly line to leader connection. Make sure your welded fly line loop is strong and not damaged, as this section can suffer extensive beatings from repetitively being stripped in and out of the rod tip under tension while casting and fighting fish. This major connection is one of the most important aspects of your entire system (rod, reel, line and leader) that allows for a smooth transition of power from the line into the leader while casting and presenting your fly.

Casting - Practice Makes Permanent!

From start to finish, every angler is fishing their best within the last 5 minutes of their trip. Why? They've had the rod in their

hands every day. Just a few minutes a day, a few days a week, will pay HUGE dividends when it's time to make the shot a few months from now. Here are some important casting and presentation skills to practice for your adventure.

Casting into the wind – We know all too well that the tropics can offer up some harsh winds to deal with while casting and fishing the salt. Even for the most experienced saltwater casters, shooting line into the wind usually ends with some degree of slack within the system upon final presentation.

In most circumstances, slack is not our friend when saltwater fly fishing. When trying to achieve a critically important straightline slack less presentation into the wind, try carrying the ENTIRE amount of line you need to make the cast. Then when its time to present you shouldn't need to shoot line to make the final presentation you need to make. Holding on tight to the fly line with your line hand, and not shooting any line at all during final presentation, will force all the condensed energy within the loop into the leader, dramatically increasing the odds of a slackless straight line presentation. Even into the wind! You get out of it what you put into it! So, if you apply a lot of power, you will get a powerful return. High line speed, tight loops and low trajectory all help to make for a great slackless presentation into the wind.

Presenting on your Back Cast - I believe one of the most important and underrated saltwater fly casts is presenting on your back cast.

Effectively presenting on your back cast doubles your odds of taking advantage of your opportunities. It's very important to remember that a BACK cast is a BACK cast. That means your back is toward your target. Practicing until you are comfortable and competent presenting on your back cast will pay huge dividends.



FLY FISHING EXERCISES




Club, speaking from experience, none of us are getting any younger, and may now start feeling the effects of aging, which could hamper your fly fishing!! I know it has had it's effect on me. However, we CAN do something about it. Well here is what you can do to change that. Start an exercise routine, and you will see many benefits, and maybe even a better cast!!!!

Thoracic Extension	Thoracic Rotation
Setup - Begin in a sitting upright position with your arms crossed over your chest. Movement - Slowly arch your trunk backwards and hold, then return to an upright position and repeat.	 Setup - Begin lying on your side with your bottom leg straight, top leg bent at 90 a degree angle, arms straight on the ground. Movement - Slowly move your top arm away from your other arm, toward the floor on the other side, rotating your trunk at the same time.
Bicep Curl – Band or Weight	Deltoid Raise – Band or Weight
 Setup - Begin standing upright holding the ends of a resistance band in each hand. Movement - Place your anchor hand near your opposite hip, then bend your other elbow, pulling against the resistance. Hold briefly, then return to the starting position and repeat. 	 Setup - Begin in a standing upright position holding one end of a resistance band anchored under your foot with your thumb pointing forward. Movement - Lift your arm straight forward to shoulder height, then slowly lower it back down and repeat.
Triceps Extension – At Side	Triceps Extension – At Shoulder Level
 Setup - Begin in standing upright position with one arm bent, holding a resistance band, and your opposite hand holding the band below. Movement - Straighten your bottom arm, pulling against the resistance band. Slowly return to the starting position and repeat. 	 Setup - Begin sitting in a chair holding the end of a resistance band in one hand. You should be facing away from the anchor point and supporting your elbow with your other hand. Movement - Pull against the band, straightening your elbow, then repeat.

CASTING UNDER STRUCTURE -- THE HORIZONTAL CAST



Why climb to the top of a mountain? Because that's where the views are. Also, perhaps, to demonstrate an ability, a skill to achieve something others cannot.

Why cast to difficult places? Because often, that's where the fish are. Also, perhaps, to demonstrate your grand casting skills, to impress your fishing buddy to generate admiration amongst the gathered crowd. But mostly, to catch fish.

Fish often hold against and under overhead structure – cut banks and overhanging vegetation provide protection from would be predators – eagles, ospreys or terrestrial piscivores – while also providing a good conveyance of food. Similarly, docks provide protective structure, shade, and a nutrition-rich environment. The same again for mottes of mangrove trees in saltwater.

Of course, this overhead structure also provides protection from the unprepared fly-fisher – the required angle of approach is such that the traditional vertical cast isn't a great option. The fly-fishers best choice to reach fish holding under structure is the horizontal cast – a cast providing an approach nearly paralleling the water.

The components of a good horizontal cast are the same as those for any cast – proper timing and power –but let's consider some variables unique to the horizontal cast and how the caster can prepare to employ it.

Gravity – gravity, of course, is an always present force, but the horizontal caster will need to pay particular attention to her line due to its proximity to the water.

Line Speed – To combat gravity, the horizontal caster will want to generate a higher line speed -- this helping to keep the line aloft – just above the foreheads of unsuspecting fish.

Power – To increase line speed, the caster will generally increase the power of her cast. The power should be applied smoothly – a misapplication of power will, as with any cast, generate a tailing loop. Tailing loops cause "wind knots" and wind knots aren't fun. Some casters will find that adding "translation" that is the forward movement of the rod without rotation -- is helpful to smoothing out the power.

Practice – An excellent drill for mastering the horizontal cast is the Line (or Grass) Drill. To execute the line drill, the caster should position herself below two cones – one to her left and one to her right*. Casting horizontally, she should smoothly accelerate from the left cone and stop crisply at the right, allowing the line to extend and drop. This smooth application of power and a crisp stop will produce a tight loop and cause the line to straighten parallel to a positioned (or imaginary) line.

The caster should continue the drill by practicing from right to left and left to right – eventually keeping the line aerialized in a horizontal cast.

*Note. The distance between the right and left cones will vary with the amount of line outside the rod tip. The caster can experiment with the distance between the cones.

Other considerations:

Accuracy – Most casters find the traditional vertical cast to be the most accurate – this, in part, due to the line, leader and fly rolling out in direct line with the intended target – an overpowered vertical cast may slap the water, but it will not necessarily be off-target. Conversely, an overpowered horizontal cast, will kick the fly left if the caster is right-handed (right, if left-handed). An underpowered horizontal cast will fall short and right of target if right-handed (short and left, if left-handed). Practicing is the key to accuracy with the horizontal cast – practice such that the power presents the fly to the target – either in anticipation of, or without, the "kick".

Horizontal Roll Cast – If you need to present a fly under structure to your front, but have obstruction to your rear, you'll want to learn the horizontal roll cast – a very useful cast. This cast is simply a roll-cast (link to roll-cast article) with two differences. First, you set the anchor farther out from the body. Second, the rod plane is near horizontal – just as with the standard horizontal cast.

So, develop a new skill – practice and perfect your horizontal cast. They're waiting for you... just beneath that tree branch... the one with the Dave's Hopper hanging from it.


