The Texas Fly Fishers will present its 14th Annual Summer Mini Fly Fishing Exposition, Saturday, August 19, 2023, 8:30 am until 4:30 pm which will include fly fishing related topics of interest to most every fly fisher be they beginner, intermediate or expert!

History of the Annual Summer Mini Expo

Most Texas FlyFisher's monthly meetings were playing to a full house; every month with the exception August. For some reason, the August meeting was drawing less than half of the audience of the other 10 months. So, in 2009, then Club President David Lemke came up with a plan to pick up the August monthly meeting attendance. David's idea was, instead of holding a typical meeting with a guest speaker, to hold a mini expo featuring the club membership's talent at fly tying, rod building, knot tying / leader building, casting and fly fishing destination travel and to do so in an exposition format.

So, the first Texas Fly Fishers Summer Mini Expo was held on August 25th 2009 at the Houston Bayland Community Center, the same venue as the club's monthly meetings at that time. Inside the Center, club members were set up to demonstrate their prowess at fly tying, rod building, basic knot tying, leader basics and rigging. Other members were on hand to report on their trips to destinations such as the Bighorn River in Montana, the Guadalupe River in the Texas Hill Country, fly fishing for salmon in Alaska and fly fishing along the Texas Gulf Coast. Outside, the Club's Fly Fly Fishers International Certified Casting Instructors were holding casting demonstrations and clinics. The night went on without a hitch and was closed with a drawing for some great prizes.

After the success of the initial Mini Expo, it was decided to make this an annual event with the only change coming in 2014, when it was decided to move the Summer Mini Expo from the traditional last Tuesday night of the month to the Saturday before and making it a day-long event in hopes of offering a few additional programs and in an effort to attract a few more interested fly fishers.

Since its inception, the Mini Expo has continued to grow; so, the club is looking for another large turnout at this year's event. We look forward to seeing you there!

Fly Tying

Inside, there will be non-stop fly tying demonstration and instruction. Learn tips and techniques or, how to tie that special pattern of interest to you from the club's fly tying members.

Rod Building

Club members who participate in the rod building section of fly fishing will be demonstrating their custom built rods and will be available to discuss rod building techniques.

Casting



All participants are encouraged to bring their own rod with line and leader for the casting clinics; however, the Texas FlyFishers will have a limited supply of rods for anyone who is interested in participating but did not bring a rod.

FLY FISHING WITH SKIP KING

While doing my daily trolling on social media, a post really caught my attention. Bamboo Fly Rods near me!!! So, after a quick review, it drew me to the Scarborough Fair in Waxahachie to connect with Skip King of King Fly Rods.

After arriving, and seeing I was not in proper attire, LOL, I made it to Skip's booth, and knew this was something special! The presentation of his both included wicker creels, flies, knives, and then my eyes focused on the hand crafted bamboo rods. I have always been fascinated with bamboo rods, and these rods take it to another level! The craftsmanship was off the chart, and when handling them, ever so gently, which I think we all do when handling bamboo rods, I knew I needed to cast some of his offerings. Skip removed several from his display case, and when to try a few out. I started off with a 7 weight, then a 5 weight, then a three weight, and then the one I probably should not have. A little two weight, and then I knew that I must own one! I would cast it for a bit, and then turn my head to see if my wife was watching, and thankfully she was NOT paying attention. The next thought I had was what do I need to get one, and then Skip mentioned building one for me, and it was at that moment, I knew it was going to happen!!

Skip and I had a great chat about the how to's in regards to bamboo rod making, and how he really focuses on the quality of his rods. It is such a thrill to cast bamboo, as it takes me back to the early years of how fly fishing started, and the purity of the sport. We then changed our conversations towards fishing these rods, and how the perception is that they are fragile, and fly fishers are not knowledgeable about fishing these rods. So my next question was to see if he wanted to go fishing, so he could show me how beautiful they are to fish with and durable as well. So that's what we did, on a glorious spring day.

Skip and I loaded up, and went towards Central Texas, to a lake known to have high populations of small bass, and all sorts of panfish. This way we knew we would be able to give the rods a good testing on many varieties of fish. Many fish were caught on this spectacular day, out of our kayaks, which was a first for Skip. I watched as he drifted effortlessly across the lake, and could tell, he was so hooked at that moment. I see a kayak in his possession soon!! We had a great time, and I so look forward to a new friendship, and of course, a new handcrafted, personalized, gorgeous two weight fly rod!!!!

After having such a great time, we decided to do it again, and this time we explored wading the clear waters of the Brazos River. Our initial entry into this gem of a river, we experienced extremely low water, but having fished this area many years ago, we waded downstream, and was rewarded with deeper, cooler water, and a plentiful amount of bass and my favorite in this

stretch, the Longear Sunfish. These aggressive fish can really hit and put a bend in any rod. We had a great time, and it really brought me back to some wonderful memories of times in the past, that were had on the Brazos.

TEXAS

THE MOST VERSATILE OF MENDS

If you open a craftsman's tool cabinet, you'll likely find two types of tools -- specialized tools intended to participate in a particularly unique activity – something like a tongue and groove plane -- and versatile tools, purposed to be useful in any number of circumstances – the Swiss Army Knife being a leading exemplar.

So too it is with fly casting mends. Some are designed to meet a very particular circumstance – for example, the Curve Cast's (a mend) singular purpose is to bend the fly line around an obstruction and present the fly to the other side. It's very useful...for one thing.

Conversely, the Wiggle Mend is the most versatile of mends. It isn't especially good for anything... but it's reasonably good for everything.

The Wiggle Mend is designed to induce equal "waves" of slack during the presentation cast (figure 1). Slack in your fly line is usually undesirable, but the slack created by the Wiggle Mend is intended to allow for the drag free drift of dry flies. It is useful for casting downstream, providing long drag-free drifts. It is also a great option when confronted with complex currents. As an example, the well known (and beautifully named) Texas Hole on the San Juan River in northern New Mexico has dozens of complex currents that play hosts to a multitude of large trout feeding on seemingly ever-present midges. How to present a midge fly forty feet across seven separate currents – yes -- the Swiss Army Knife of mends – the Wiggle Mend.

How do we produce a Wiggle Mend?

Step 1: Stop the rod. Mends, by definition, are created after the loop is formed by the forward stop on the presentation cast. If you're moving your rod after your forward stop, you're mending the line (the exception being the required follow of the rod down to the water on a non-mended cast). The crisper and more complete the stop, the better your loop "face" and the better your opportunity for a good mend.

Step 2: Wiggle the rod tip. Small wiggles produce small waves, big wiggles produce big waves. In practice and in use, your goal is to produce uniform waves. A few observations. First, begin your wiggles soon after your loop is formed. Sooner is better and begins the process of moving the wiggle down your line and toward your tippet. Your wiggle mend is only as good as the wiggles nearest the fly. Second, attempt to keep your elbow as the pivot point of your wiggle. A static pivot point helps to produce consistent shape and spacing of the waves. To that

purpose, as your elbow drops during the cast and subsequent mend, try anchoring it to your hip.

Step 3: Follow the wiggle down to the water. As your wiggles are forming, you'll begin slowly moving your rod and following your fly line to the water. Importantly, you'll want to continue your wiggles until just before the line contacts the water – if you stop too early, the forward momentum of the line will undo your efforts...and onlookers will consider rendering aid for involuntary arm movements.

Considerations: The Wiggle Mend may be challenging to complete in high winds but performs better in such conditions than mends with similar intentions – such as the Pile Cast. The Wiggle Mend is not an especially accurate cast. If you are casting to a particular fish or feature, you'll need to consider aiming past that point three to four feet (to allow for the wiggles) or slipping line during the presentation – the latter being challenging to achieve while maintaining good waves. For additional

functionality, try combing the wiggle mend with a roll cast, or even another mend like the reach mend.

Now back to the Texas Hole. Having produced a good wiggle mend traversing a complex set of currents, you'll need to be particularly attuned to the fortunes of your fly. Should it be subtly sipped from the foam, a quick set is required - -remember, you've purposely induced slack into your cast. What were you thinking? You're not even Swiss.





SUMMER FLY PATTERN



Years ago, I attended a monthly meeting of the Fort Worth Fly Fishers, that totally changed my perspective in regards to bass fishing. You see in that stage of my fishing life, for me it was all about the numbers. A successful trip was dictated by that. But that all changed that night, when I witnessed a BIG Bass presentation, from Bob Pool. Bob was a BIG bass specialist, and he knew what attracted BIG Bass and why. I was blown away by his techniques, and especially impressed with the size of the flies he was using. He said going after BIG Bass might lower your numbers, but for him it was all about the big fish.

We spoke after the meeting and have stayed in touch over the years. A few days after the meeting, a trip was made to the local fly shop, and you guessed it, I loaded up on big bass flies. Bob also gave me a few to use, and I still have some of those to this day. It wasn't long after that, when BIG Bass dictated the success of my trips. More and more large fish came to hand, and I was changed!!

Now it was time for me to tie flies, that would enhance my experience, and make me even more successful, and again I was successful with that. I experimented with different patterns, with different materials, and really fell in love tying with foam! It floats so good, is almost indestructible, and is easily shaped into some extremely large flies. Enter in Ratzilla!!! I have always been intrigued with mouse patterns, and have had great success using various mice patterns, but wanted to create a very large one, in a



rat profile. Reason being that I fish a lot of rivers, and have seen good size rats eaten by bass, or jumping into the river to get away from predators. So, I sat down with a cold one, and the Ratzilla was created. Soon the fly would be on the end of my line, and crushed by some extremely large bass, to my deepest pleasure!!!

It's really a simple fly, that has quite a few steps, and uses really only a few materials. I hope this inspires you to change the way you think about BIG Bass fishing, like Bob did for me. It forever changed the way I approach the sport, and it will you too. Go BIG or GO HOME!!!!

Thank you, Bob Pool for being there for me.

Ratzilla Tying Steps

- 1. Insert Mustad 2XH / 4XL Stainless Steel Hook into vice and attach heavy thread
- 2. Cut 2 strips of foam. One wider and longer than the other of different colors
- 3. Cut 2 strips of rabbit. One longer than the other
- 4. Cut a heavy piece of monofilament line, and bend it in the middle using a hot needle
- 5. Trim rabbit fur from half of the rabbit strip
- 6. Attach the strip at the bend of the hook with the heavy thread
- 7. Poke a hole into strip, and insert monofilament line. Then wrap the line onto the hook. Add small amount of glue to both sides of the hole where the line went through. Let dry
- 8. Trim foam before attaching to the hook
- 9. Cover the hook with the heavy thread
- 10. Put glue onto hook and attach foam to the hook with the heavy thread
- 11. Tie in the longest rabbit strip
- 12. Tie in 5 strands of silly legs / spinner bait skirt works best
- 13. Prepare 2nd smaller piece of foam
- 14. Attach foam to the hook
- 15. Wrap the rabbit strip onto the hook, moving it towards the eye of the hook
- 16. Part the rabbit fur that was tied onto the hook
- 17. Pull the foam loosely over the rabbit strip and tie down
- 18. Pull the 2nd piece of foam over the rabbit strip loosely and tie down
- 19. Pull both pieces of foam back towards the bend of the hook, creating a large round head on the fly. Tie down. Then cut a small colorful piece of foam and tie that down. This will act as an indicator for the fly, so it's easier to see
- 20. Next 3 steps are trimming the foam
- 21. Then cover the thread wraps on the fly with glue. All areas
- 22. Part the fur of the rabbit strip on the bottom of the fly
- 23. Put glue on the underside of the rabbit strip. This will keep the fur out away from the body of the fly
- 24. Tie knots into the legs of the fly
- 25. Trim the legs
- 26. Go fish the Ratzilla, a mostly indestructible fly, that will catch Giant Bass!!!


