#### TEXAS PARKS AND WILDLIFE NEWS

HUGE News coming out as a House of Representative Member from Waco, Pat Curry has presented a bill on March the 13<sup>th</sup>, to abolish the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and to realign the current format into other state agencies. As we are hearing this news, it comes to us as a shock, and left our heads spinning on why, what, and unfortunately when?

If HB 4938 passes, it would go into effect on September 1<sup>st</sup>, 2025. Then, the General Land offices would take over specific duties. The Department of Agriculture would take over specific duties. And the Department of Public Safety would also take over specific duties. That seems to be a very fast turnaround, for a program that is as large as TPWD, and for an agency that all of us have supported for many years. If this bill moves forward to a hearing, it will be time for the public to voice their concerns or support for the bill to move forward. At that time, we should all be prepared to do just that. Let's educate ourselves on the entire process, and only after that should we consider how we react to the bill, and what our action should be, as a public entity.

The Texas Council will do our part, by doing just that. Following the process, educating ourselves on the developing situation, and will do our part to speak, united at some point. We will also be in complete communication with all Texas Council Clubs, and it's members.

Stay tuned for updates on the various ways we communicate to the members and clubs.




#### SAD NEWS TO SHARE



## KING FLY RODS AT SCARBOROUGH RENAISSANCE FAIRE

Spring is here. It's time for fishing and for buying that rod you have wanted for years. A great place to find that rod is... Scarborough Renaissance Faire in Waxahachie. Yup, King Flyrods will be showing new bamboo rods for sale as well as taking custom orders.

Skip King has been making custom hand made split cane rods for discerning anglers and collectors in his Virginia shop for nine years. This will be his fifth year at Scarborough. In 2024 Medieval Builders built a fun booth that highlights Skip's craftsmanship. There is a fish pond to entertain young and experienced anglers. (You can watch but you can't catch).

Last year Skip gave presentation at the Fort Worth FFI club on the making of a bamboo fly rod attended by more than 90 members. This year you can visit our booth, hold a piece of exquisite craftsmanship and cast one of our beautiful split cane bamboo fly rods. You can buy or order a special order a rod to your own design.

An fly fisher must present the artificial fly to the fish as if it were a natural occurrence. The angler must also maintain that illusion as the fly drifts with the current. These two tasks require skill and a subtle hand. A bamboo fly rod is an excellent tool for the job.

While much of the equipment in fishing has become high tech traditional Bamboo Rods are experiencing a resurgence in the sport. Bamboo allows greater control of the fly and the line both in the air and on the water. Traditional bamboo rods are represent the high end of fly rods and run the gamut from workmanlike to works of art. The rod makers art is discernible in the taper, planing, and joining of the six precisely formed sections, the silk wrapping around the guides, the quality of components, and the action of the rod. Come visit King Flyrods. Cast a fine bamboo rod. You will be surprised!



## FFI PARTICPATES IN ABANDON CRAB TRAP REMOVAL

FFI Council Member Ron Ridgeway with "trophy abandoned crap trap" from West Matagorda Bay.

Each February for 23 years, volunteers spend 10 days on the water along the Texas coastline searching the bays for abandoned crab traps.

To date, they've hauled off almost 44,000 of these derelict traps, saving an estimated 720,000 blue crabs.

From Feb. 21-March 2, Texas coastal waters will be closed to crabbing with wire mesh crab traps to facilitate the annual volunteer crab trap cleanup.

The Abandoned Crab Trap Removal Program (ACTRP) was created by Senate Bill 1410 during the 77th (2001) Legislative session. This bill granted the TPWD Commission authority to create a ten-day crab trap closure that begins the third Friday of each February. Crab traps left in the water during this time are considered litter and may be disposed of appropriately. Before this law, only law enforcement officials could legally remove abandoned crab traps from Texas' marine waters. Since 2002, volunteers have removed over 40,000 abandoned traps from Texas waters.

Abandoned, lost or derelict crab traps have been identified as a significant source of mortality for a variety of organisms, many of which are recreationally or commercially important. They also create user conflicts, visual pollution and possibly have negative effects on sensitive habitats like seagrass. Not to mention the costly repairs or loss of valuable fishing time experienced by boaters and fishermen whose motors have come in.












## GREG DEMARS NEW TOP SELLING BOOK URBAN DFW FLY FISHING







Photo #2 – Make a dubbing loop and twist blended dubbing material.

This is a great cold/warm water transition fly. I fished a version of this fly at Albert Pike several months ago for trout and had one of my best days ever there. Since then I have caught some nice bass and bream. This is good fly to finish up the trout season and start with some warm water trips. It incorporates a twisted dubbing loop technique that I am really fond of because of the durability. In addition to the dubbing looped body, the bunny strip collars are twisted on thread instead of a wire brush which works much better on a small fly to help reduce the weight and material bulk buildup at the head of the fly. The rabbit strips give the fly a lot of movement in the water. I use a heavy wire nymph hook (Tiemco TMC5262) which gives the fly a more natural lateral fall through the water column even with a brass bead. Hope it works well for you.



Photo #3 – Wrap dubbing loop forward to about two eye widths from hook eye at this point make the first dubbing loop with red rabbit strip and make one complete wrap.



Photo #4 – Now form second dubbing loop with silver/gray rabbit zonker strip and wrap a couple wraps and secure behind bead.

#### Material List:

- ☐ Bead MFC 1/8"(3.3 mm) Brass Beads
- ☐ Hook Tiemco TMC5262 size 8
- ☐ Thread 70 Denier Gray (almost any color will do because thread is buried in collar).
- □ Body Dubbing 50/50 Blended Blue and Sliver Ice Dubbing
- □ Collars MFC Red and Gray Rabbit Zonker Strips (other colors work also)



Photo #5 – Brush rabbit strip collars forward to blend together and then back to smooth out for finished fly.



Photo #1 - Secure bead and wrap a slightly tapered thread body and return thread to bend of hook.



On a side note I really recommend the Smhaen dubbing twister. I have used a lot of dubbing twisters and this, hands down is my favorite. Also, the 2" Hairline Material Clip system is the best I have used. Photo #6

## UNDERSTANDING YOUR ROD'S WEIGHT, ACTION AND POWER

Fly rods have many characteristics. This article focuses on three: (1) weight; (2) action; and (3) power. Before addressing these, line weight needs to be put in the proper perspective. Many years ago the AFFTA line chart was created. When created, fly rods were made of fiberglass. Carbon fibers have replace fiberglass. Because carbon fibers are stiffer than fiberglass, rods are now faster and stiffer. Yet, the AFFTA line chart has not changed. To adapt, line manufacturers no longer adhere to the weights in AFFTA line chart. Many lines exceed the maximum grain weights in the chart.

First, there is no objective industry standard for rod weights. Rather a rod manufacturer's assigned rod weight is what it believes. Just because a rod carries a give weight does not mean the rod must be lined with a line of that weight. Second, rod action refers to where a rod bends under a given load. The faster the rod the bend will be closer to the tip. Third, power (also referred to as stiffness) refers to how much a rod will bend under a given load.

So what does this mean to the fly caster?Let's apply this to how casts must be made using the same line to achieve the same distance with two rods, one fast and stiff and the other less stiff with a medium action. Generally, properly loading the faster stiff rod requires application of more force (power) over a shorter casting arc. This stroke is generally fast over a shorter distance. More powerful rods generally require more mass to bend, that is a greater line weight. An alternative is to apply more force (power), but requires more expertise. A slower, medium action rod requires applying less force over a longer distance. Such rods tend to have a larger "sweet spot" and thus are more forgiving.

In the end, don't be afraid of over lining your rod especially if it is fast and stiff. Regardless of the action and power consider trying different line weight to feel the difference and to get the sense of how casting strokes change with differing line weights on the same rod.

Fly Fishing Merit Badge March 15, 2025

On an early Saturday morning, in the piney woods of East Texas, the members of Dallas Fly Fishers and Lonestar Fly Fishers teamed up for a joint venture at Trevor Rees-Jones Scout Camp. They conducted a beginner fly fishing course for the Scouting American Merit Badge University.

Each Scout will learn parts and balance of the fly rod and how it works, how to demonstrate the ability to cast a fly rod 30 feet consistently and accurately using both overhead and roll cast, tying flies and matching the hatch, learning about different type of flies, including wet, dry, streamers and popper flies.

Scouts demonstrate how to tie knots to prepare a fly rod for fishing. Scouts review a copy of the Texas Fishing Regulations and discuss Fishing Laws.

Further discussions include Fishing Ethics, Sportsman behavior and how it relates to fishing, Code of Scouting America, including aspects of "leave no trace".

This is a day long event and one that always is a pleasure to watch these young people learn a new sport and advance to their next levels in scouting.

#### Llano River Flood:
